Presumptive parole bill presents problems for public safety, bigger bills for counties and little investment for roads

Commissioners,

We need you to call your state senator today and express your firm opposition to House Bill 4138, the so-called "presumptive parole" measure now before the Michigan Senate. As amended, this bill will weaken public safety in our state, impose new costs on counties and provide far less in immediate new investments for roads than its proponents are claiming.

So, please, take a few moments out of your day today to call your senator (using this phone list and map) to convey the following points:

* This isn't a fix. The bill is a "solution" in search of a problem. Under present parole rules, two-thirds of felons are released within six months of their earliest release date. In MAC's view, and the view of Michigan sheriffs, prosecutors and chiefs of police, this is evidence that the decision-making on who to release is reasonable; certain felons are held longer in order to protect the public.

* The presumptions allow violent crimes. Felons who have been convicted of such crimes as murder, manslaughter, serious sexual offenses, assault and sexual abuse of a child would be eligible for presumptive parole under the current version of this bill.

* Those in prison are there for a reason. Michigan's initial prison commitment rate is 10 percent, far below the national average. This means those who go to prison in Michigan are violent and/or repeat offenders -- exactly the kind of felons who should not be automatically presumed safe for release.

* Re-offense rates are too high. Nearly a quarter of parolees and probationers are re-arrested within a year of release. About 50 percent of the prison inflow each year is due to parole/probation violations. This shows the system cannot handle an influx of parolees, and that services available to parolees (and probationers) must be increased significantly because the foilure rate is much too high.

* Parole supports lack investments. Parolees may need services such as substance abuse or mental health programs that provide support and accountability as they transition back into their communities. HB 4138, though, is silent regarding providing funding to these transition programs, as well as ensuring there are adequate jobs and housing

for parolees. The savings realized by presumptive parole should be reinvested at the community level where supervision, employment, housing and other services are provided to avoid recidivism. * New crimes mean new burdens for counties. If parolees commit a new crime, it will increase costs for local correctional systems; this will be yet another significant burden for strained county budgets. * Savings are overly optimistic. Proponents claim they can close two prisons and thereby divert tens of millions to other uses. Those projections though are based on overly optimistic projections for how many parolees will re-offend. And even if everything went exactly as proponents hope, the big savings are almost a decade away. House Bill 4138 is a problem, not a solution. Urge your senator to oppose this legislation. The Michigan Association of Counties (MAC) founded on February 1, 1898, is the only statewide organization dedicated to the representation of all county commissioners in Michigan. Please contact your SENATORS again TODAY because there will be lots of pressure to get them to say yes. We need to shore up the *NO* votes and see if we can turn the *YES* votes too.

This bill does a disservice to victims and we need to be the victim's voice.

HB 4138 would automatically parole felons from prison on their earliest release date unless "substantial and compelling reasons" exist to keep the prisoner. By 2026, the state claims it would be able to close 3,600 beds and save about \$82 million.

HB 4138 is likely to be taken up in the Senate Government Operations Committee, Chaired by Majority Leader Arlan Meekhof (R-Ottawa County) next week. It also may run on the floor as soon as next week. The bill is imminent!

HB 4138 Talking Points

Position:

 MSA opposes HB 4138 (H-4) unless violent offenses are excluded from qualification for presumptive parole and any savings are invested in local programming.

Problems:

- None of the savings would go to local programming, jails, community corrections, substance use disorder treatment, mental health services, jobs, or housing.
- All of the parolees will be in local communities.
- Violent offenders are included.
- Discretion is largely removed from the parole board.

Arguments:

- The parole board currently paroles 69% of prisoners within 6 months of their earliest release date, and 82% are released within 1 year of their earliest release date. The parole board is releasing most felons near ERD, so there must be good reason for keeping the other 18% a little longer.
- In Michigan, 23% of parolees and 24% of probationers are rearrested within 1 year of release from supervision, and 50% of prison commitments are probation and parole violations.
- It is hard to get into prison in Michigan. Initial prison commitment rate is only 10%, most of them violent, habitual criminals. In 2013 there were only 5,135 new prison commitments out of a total of 50,817 felony dispositions.

Solutions:

- Exclude violent offenses from presumptive parole (murder 2, CSC, Assault, etc.)
- Require any savings to be driven to locals.

Michigan Wind 1 and 2 Valuation Disclosures

Submitted to Michigan Tax Tribunal

On October 2, 2015 Valuation Disclosures for Michigan Wind 1's 46 turbines located in Bingham and Sheridan Townships of Huron County for tax year 2013, 2014, and 2015 were filed with the MTT. Michigan Winds total original cost was in excess of 150 million dollars and was completed in 2008. The appeal filed by Exelon was over the issue of the multiplier tables used. For the 2013 tax year the assessors used the original 2011 multipliers and in 2014 and 2015 the AE Multipliers were used. The valuation disclosure was over 300 pages in length.

On October 2, 2015 Valuation Disclosures for Michigan Wind 2's 37 turbines located

in Delaware Township of Sanilac County for tax year 2013, 2014, and 2015 were filed with the MTT. The Michigan Wind 2 project also included the townships of Marion and Minden with a total number of turbines of 50. The total original cost was in excess of 200 million dollars and was completed in 2011. The appeal filed by Exelon was over the issue of the multiplier tables used. For the 2013 & 2014 tax year the multipliers based on Detroit Edison's Depreciation Case approved by the MPSC the depreciation rate used was 3.39% per year(.961 tax year 2013 and .9271 for 2014) and in 2015 the AE Multipliers were used. The valuation disclosure was over 250 pages in

length.

The valuation disclosures were developed by Appraisal Economics Inc. after reviewing mountains of data including but not limited to Purchase Power Agreements, Operating Data to determine Capacity Factors, financial statements, market sales, and cost of construction of similar projects to name just a few of the components.

These are the first Wind Energy System Appeals at Michigan Tax tribunal.

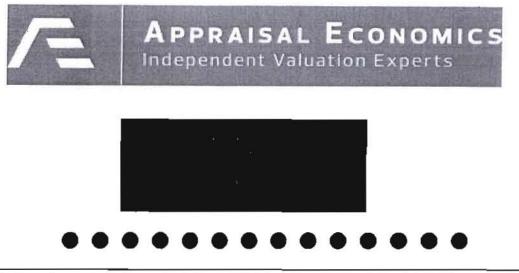

Tech Tip: What Does Wind Turbine Capacity Factor

The capacity factor of a power plant is the ratio of its actual output over a period of time, to its potential output if it were possible for it to operate at fullnameplate capacity continuously over the same period of time. To calculate the capacity factor, take the total amount of energy the plant produced during a period of time and divide by the amount of energy the plant would have produced at full capacity. Capacity factors vary greatly depending on the type of fuel that is used and the design of the plant. The capacity factor should not be confused with the availability factor, capacity credit (firm capacity) or with efficiency. So let's calculate the capacity factor for a 50 turbine wind park with each having a 2 mW nameplate.

- What's a mW? Its 1000 kw!
- How Many Hours in a Year? 24 Hours/ day * 365 days= *8760 Hours per year
- Assume a Wind Park has 50 –2mw Turbines
- If each wind turbine ran at maximum (100%) every hour of the year it would produce;

⇒ 50 x 2mW x 8760 hours = 876,000 mWh(876,000,000 kWh)

- Assume a 50 turbine wind park with each turbine having a name plate capacity of 2 mW produces 350,000 mWh per year.
- So What is the Capacity Factor?

 \Rightarrow 350,000 mWh divided by 876,000 (350,000/876,000)= .4 or 40% Capacity Factor

So why is capacity factor important? Purchased Power Agreements (PPA) signed by the wind owner may receive a fixed amount per mWh for each mWh produced. So the higher the capacity factor the more money the wind park owner receives to pay debt, maintenance and increased profit.

- Assume the wind park receives \$70 per mWH
- With a 40% Capacity Factor the Revenue = \$70 per mWh x 350,000 mwh = \$24,500,000
- If the Capacity Factor is 30% the Revenue = 262,800 mWh are produced x \$70 per mWh= \$18,396,000
- 10% loss in Capacity Factor mean a loss of revenue of \$6,104,000 per year.

So location, location location, is the key for wind parks. Information available from MPSC submitted orders most new wind parks in the Thumb are operating at between 35% to 40% capacity factors. Siting and new technology are the key components to seeing increased capacity factors.

Capacity Factors make the cash register ring!

NextERA Tuscola Bay 1: Gilford Township-Tuscola County and Blumfield Township-Saginaw County

The NextEra Tuscola Bay 1 Project which consists of 75 turbines, 68 turbines in Gilford Township Tuscola County and 7 turbines located in Blumfield Township Saginaw County was completed in 2012. There are two issues the taxpayer is appealing one being the multiplier tables and the second being the taxpayer wants the 30% 1603 grant it received deducted from the original cost. In the tax year 2013 the taxpayer did not correctly file so the case was discharged. In tax year 2014 and 2015 the taxpayer is appealing both the multipliers and 30% grant issue. On site visits by Appraisal Economics are scheduled for early October 2015 with valuation disclosures due November 5, 2015. This is a very significant case that can have wide reaching impacts to all wind projects.

Current Activities

- Many legal and consulting hours have been spent on appeals this past month. Once again these are the first appeals ever regarding wind turbines which hopefully will lead to quicker times in the future. Due to the increase in time spent on this issue expect a more expensive stage during this effort.
- Some committee meetings, etc. on State Senator Nof's legislation that would eliminate the 10% renewable requirement for all Michigan utilities

and rely on integrated resource planning to continue new investments in renewables. Action later in the year maybe if the road deal gets done.

- Efforts are still on going to find an opportunity for a solution to the multiplier issue at the STC.
- Exelon and NextERA were the only wind park owners filing appeals for 2015. Clark Hill has responded to all 2015 appeals on the townships behalf. Approximately 127 tur-

bines are involved in these appeals. There were no appeals filed by DTE, Consumers, or Heritage. Nothing was filed to our knowledge at the STC regarding classifications.
